
The Reason Stack (理由の積み木)

## Komika Axis

### "One Reason"



"Kara"  
(Because)



Oishii **kara**, tabemasu.  
(Because it's tasty, I eat).

## Komika Axis

### "Multiple Reasons"



"Shi"  
(And... And...)

Yasui **shi**,  
oishii **shi**,  
tabemasu.

(It's cheap **AND**  
tasty, so I eat).

**"Kara"** provides one direct reason. **"Shi"** is used to list **multiple** features to build a stronger case.

It's like saying:  
"Not only this,  
but also that..."




# Structure: [Plain Form] + [Shi]

Iku → Iku shi

Oishii → Oishii shi



# Sentence Assembly Line




彼はハンサムだし、優しいし、人気があります。

He is handsome **AND** kind, so he is popular.

Like puzzle pieces!  
They connect the plain  
forms to build the  
sentence.

See! The **[da shi]** and **[shi]**  
are the **glue** that holds the  
reasons together!

# Raya's Hack: The Implied Conclusion




You don't always  
need to say the result.  
If you stack enough  
reasons, the listener  
guesses the rest!


## **\*\*Example:**

**Ame da shi, samui shi...**  
(It's raining, and it's cold...)

\*[So I don't want to go out!]"

# Summary: ~Shi (~し)

- **Function:** Listing multiple reasons / “And also”
- **Nuance:** Emphasizes cumulative points.
- **Verb / i-Adj:** Plain Form + **shi** (e.g., Iku shi, Oishii shi)
- **Noun / na-Adj:** DA + **shi** (e.g., Benri da shi)

Stack your reasons to make your point.
