When you have a solid schedule or fact, you use HAZU DESU. It's not a blind guess—it's what logically must happen!

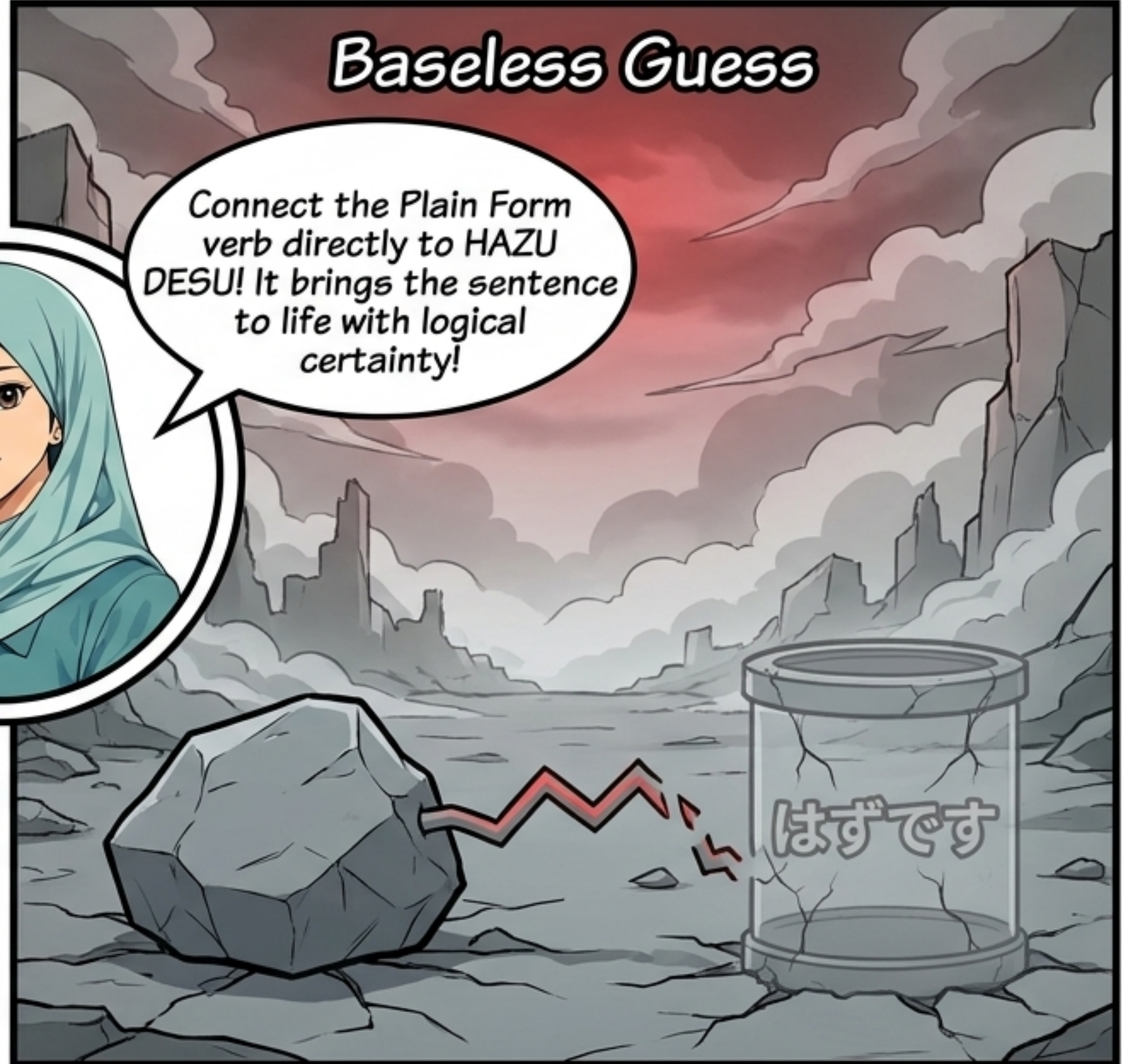
The Fact Engine: Verb Plain Form + はずです

The Fact Engine

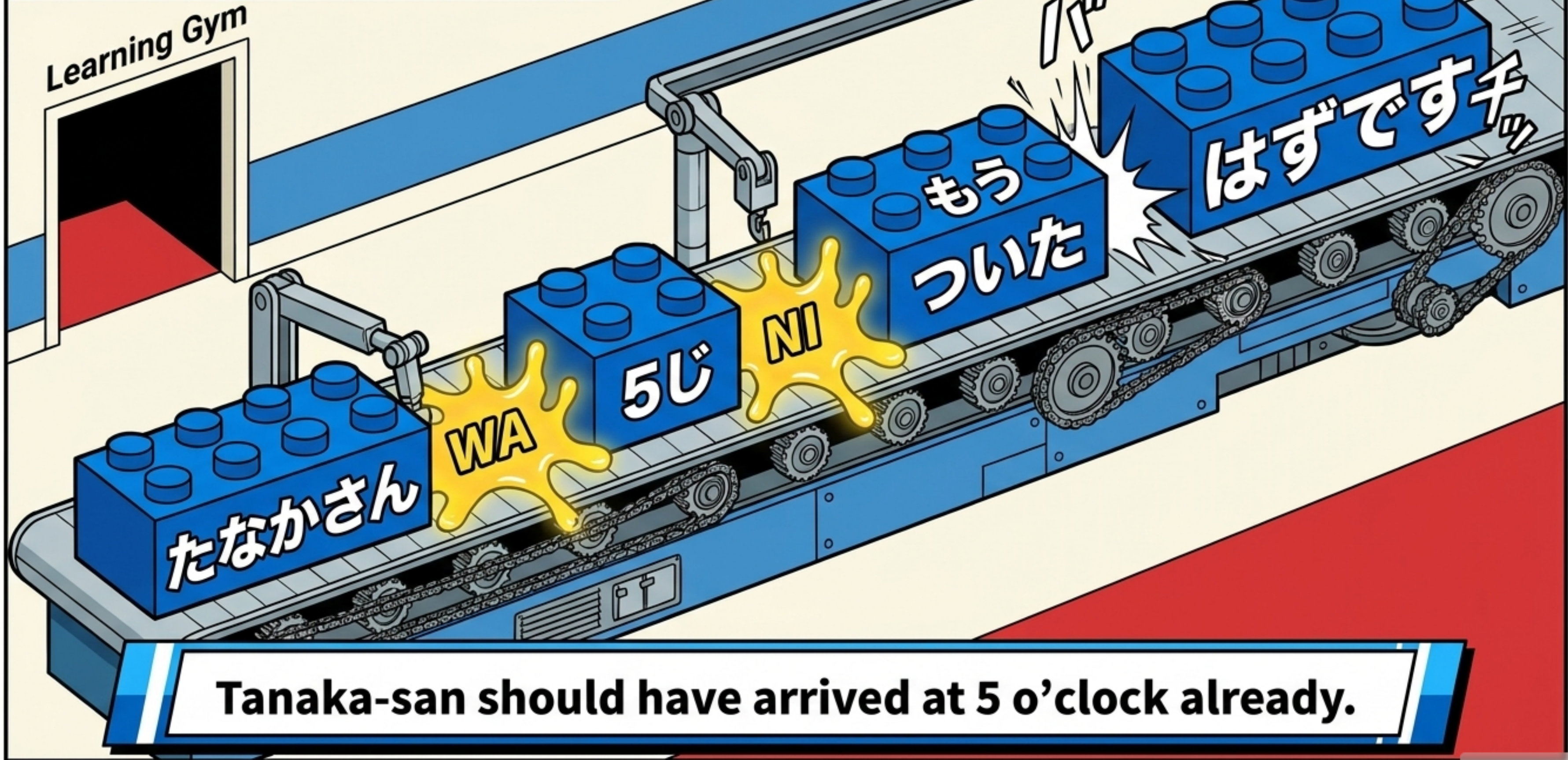


Connect the Plain Form verb directly to HAZU DESU! It brings the sentence to life with logical certainty!

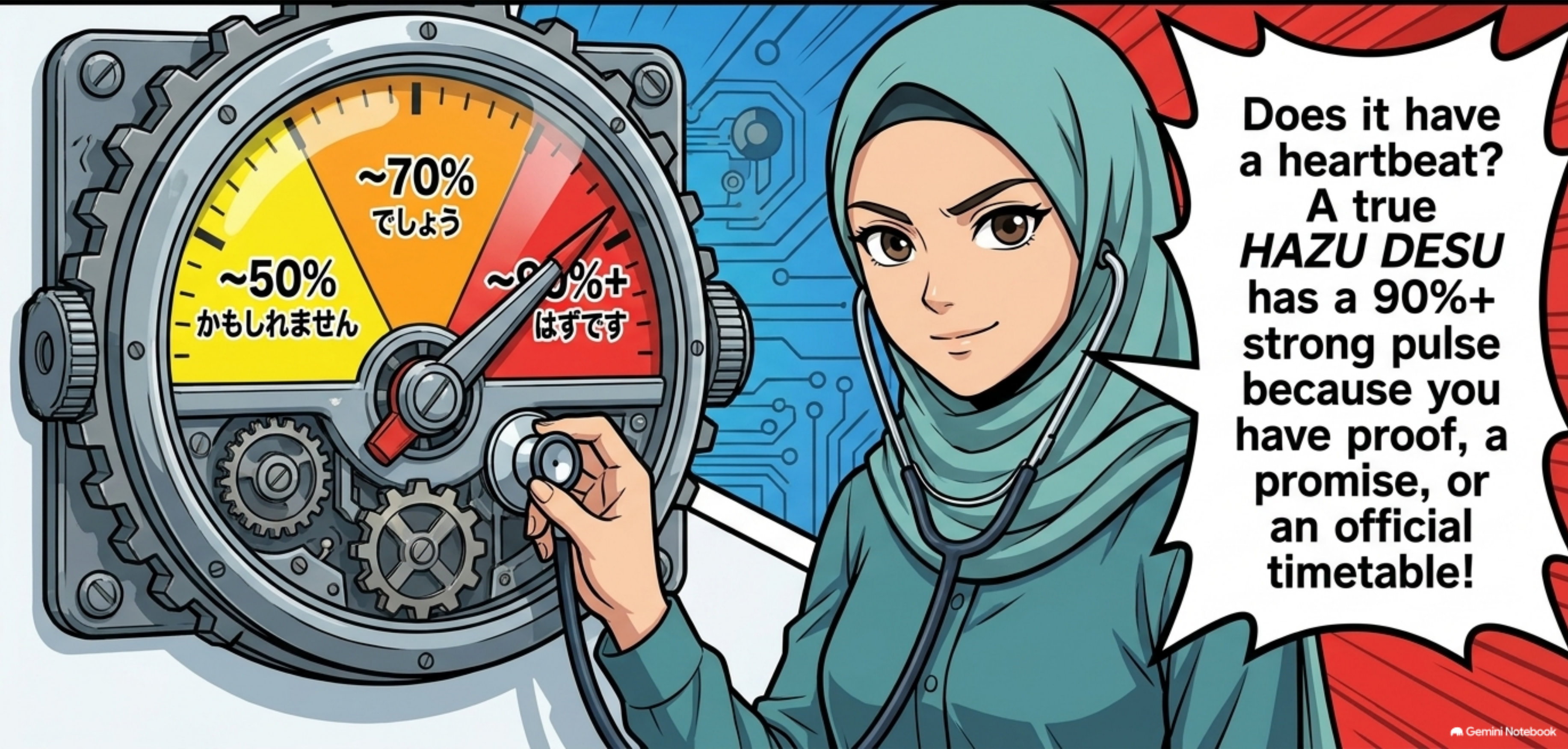
Baseless Guess

Grammar Cheat Sheet: HAZU DESU

Structure:

Verb Plain Form + はずです

Meaning: **Should / Expected to [Verb]**

Basis: Objective evidence, schedule, promise, or rule.

Golden Rule: Always use Short/Plain Form before
はず (Never ます / ました)!

Examples: **くる はずです (Should come),**
ついた はずです (Should have arrived).
