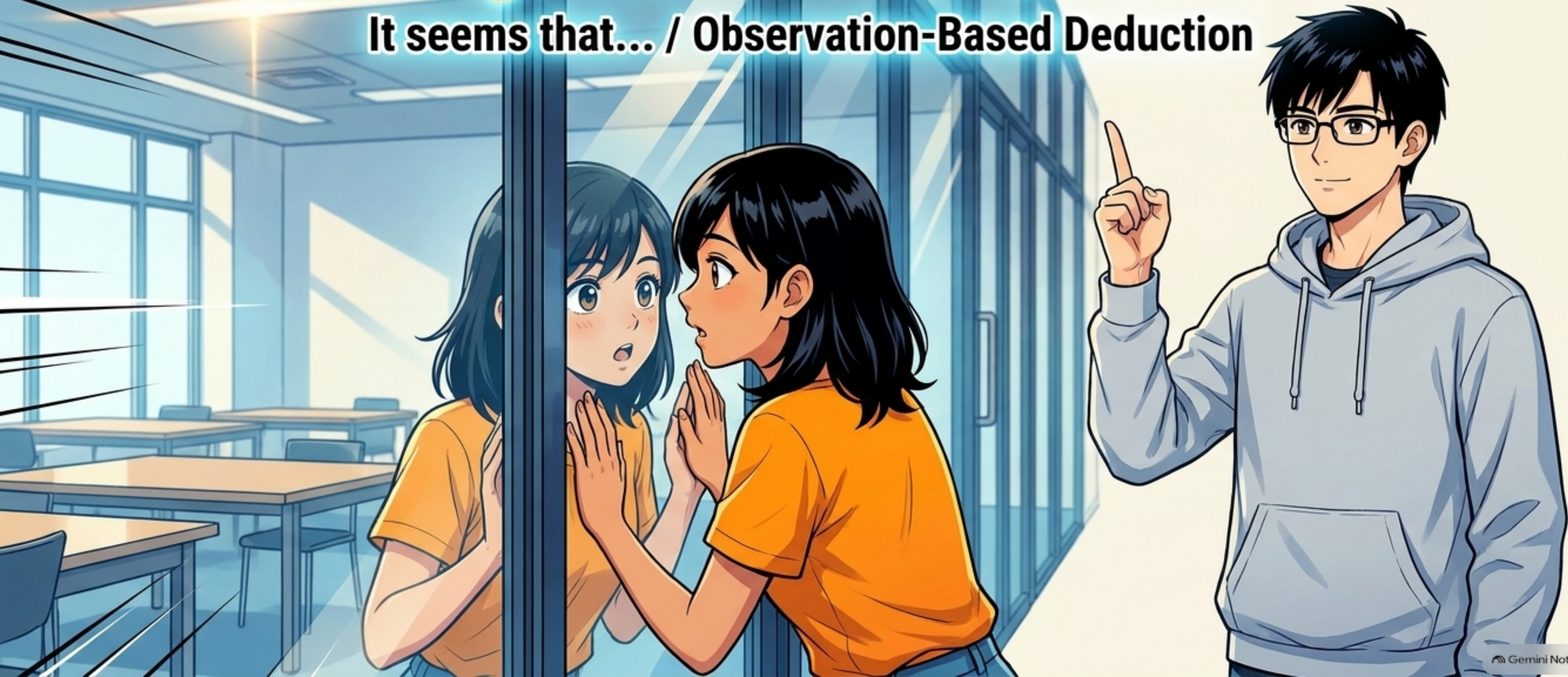
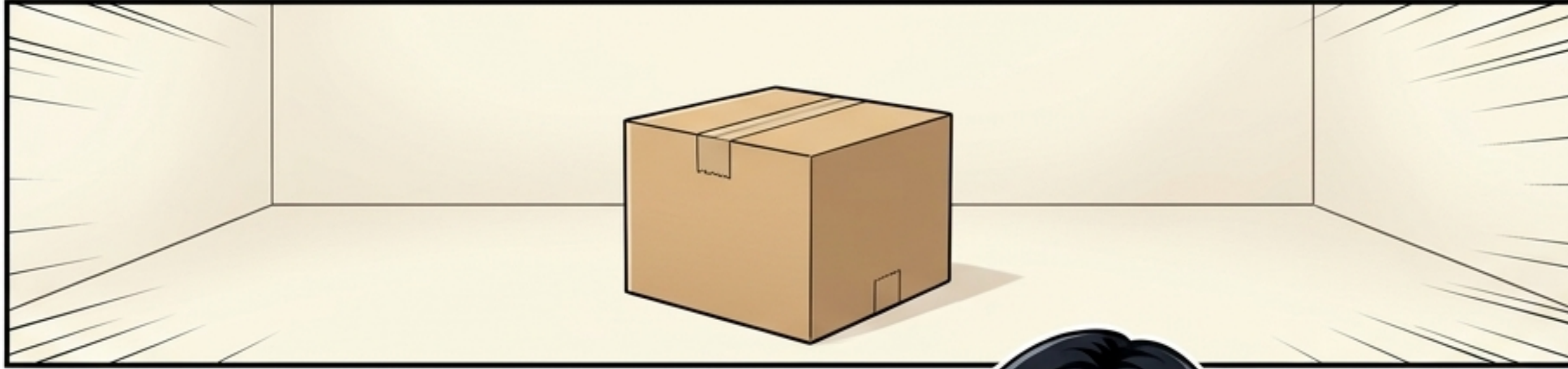


な -adjective + なようです

It seems that... / Observation-Based Deduction



Making Deductions from Clues



(It seems this room is quiet.)

We use **ようです** to deduce a condition based on clear circumstantial evidence (like seeing a soundproof room or high-security glass).

Grammatically, “You” is ALIVE (It’s a Noun!)

Because “You” (よう) behaves like a living Noun, it needs the **NA Bridge** to connect to Na-adjectives!

な
(NA)

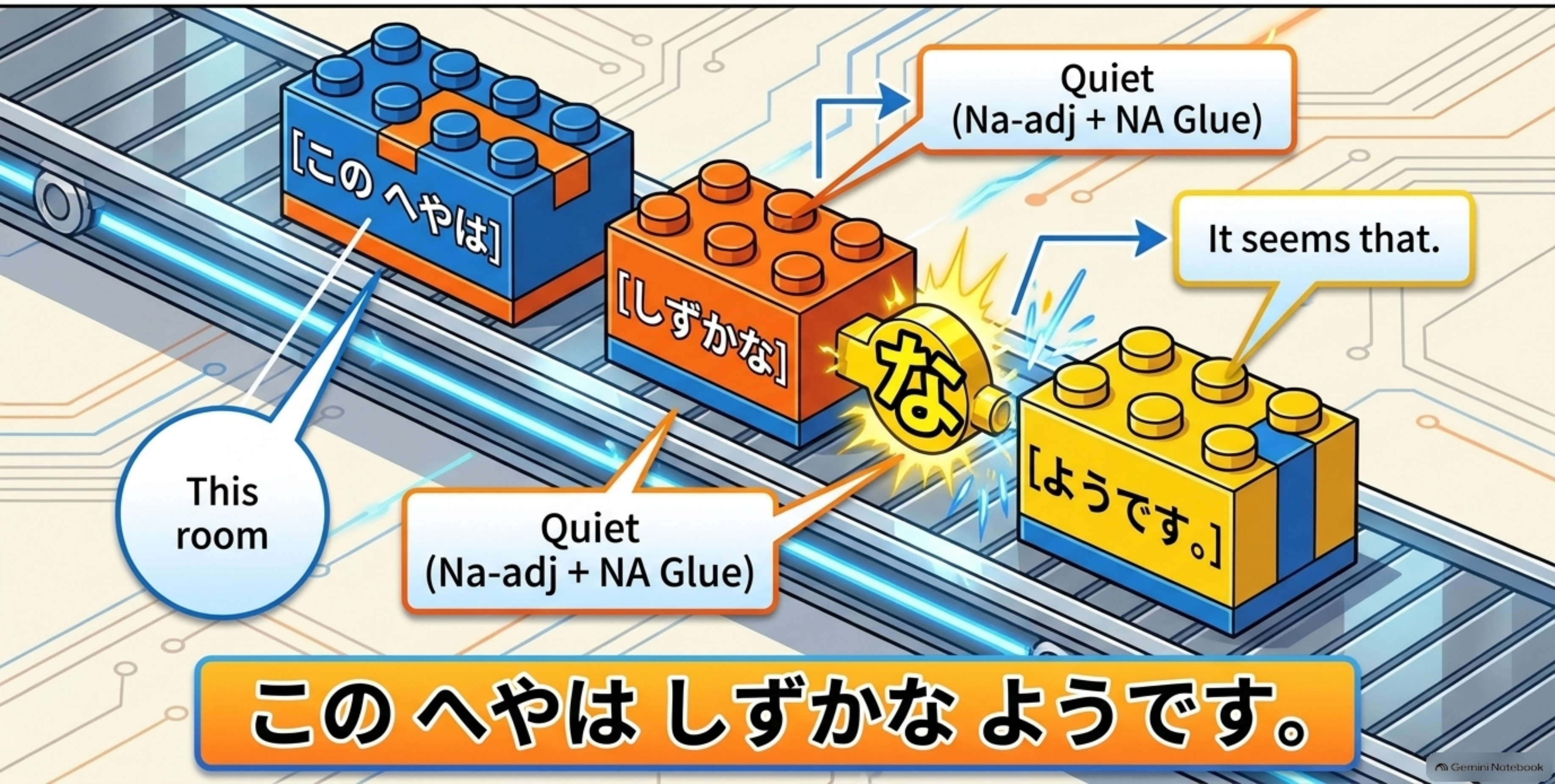
しずか + な + ようです

(Quiet)

(Noun-like behavior)

Na-adjectives require 'な' to connect to 'ようです', which acts as a noun.

The Sentence Assembly Line



Raya's Hack

Does it have a heartbeat? NA
for Present
Affirmative—NEVER DA!

しずかなようです

Present: しずかなようです

Past: しずかだったようです

Negative: しずかじゃないようです

DON'T DO THIS! (Treating "You" like a dead object)



Using 'だ' or dropping 'な' kills the connection!
To modify 'you desu' in present affirmative, you **MUST** use 'na'.



Deductions Cheat Sheet

な-adjective Base + な + ようです。

✓ Present:	しずかな ようです (It seems quiet)
✓ Negative:	しずかじゃない ようです
✓ Past:	しずかだった ようです

ALWAYS use な in the present affirmative! (Never だ!)
