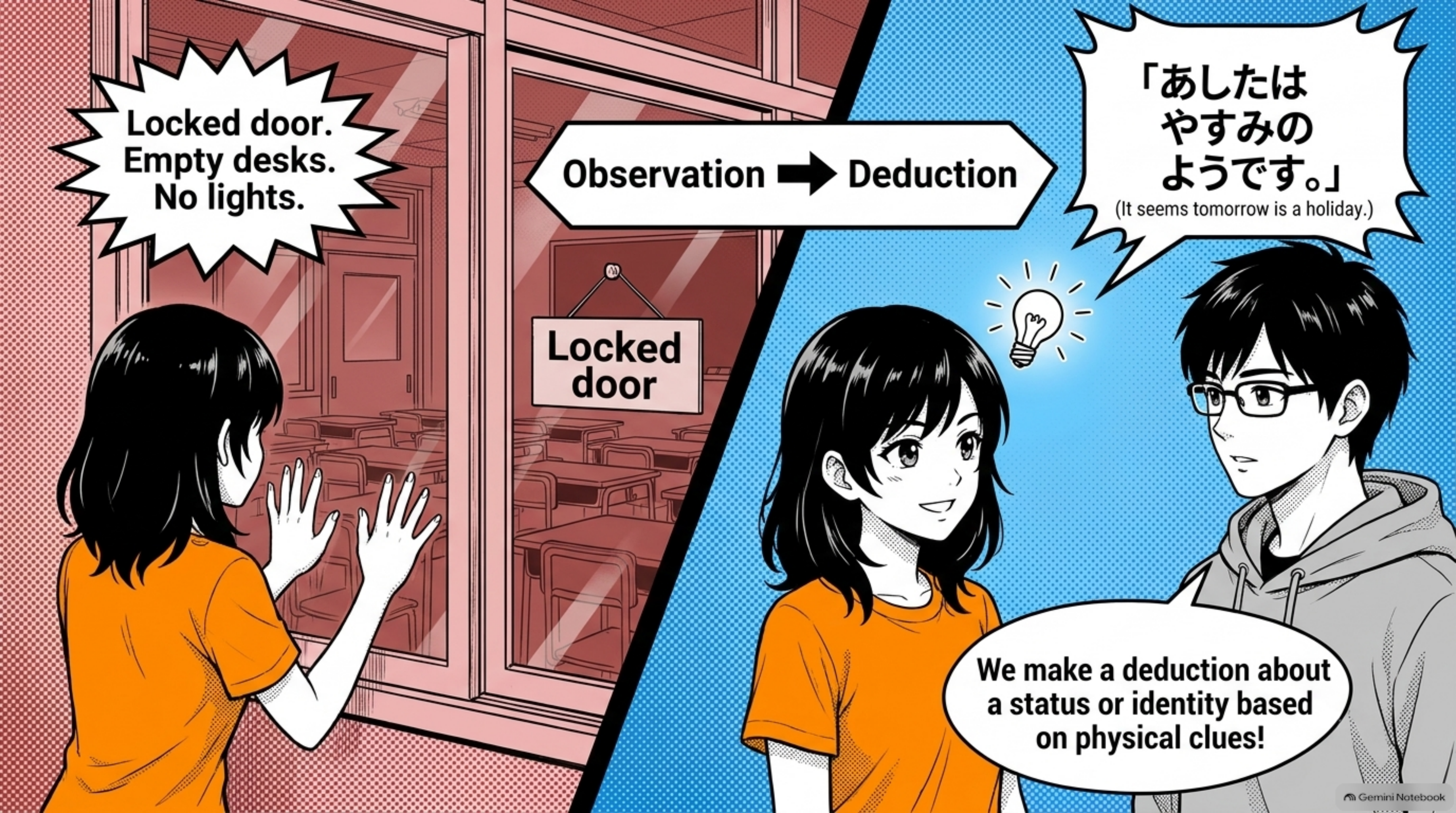


Noun + のようです

It seems that [Noun] /
It appears to be...



Observation-Based
Deduction
(状態・身分の推測)



Locked door.
Empty desks.
No lights.

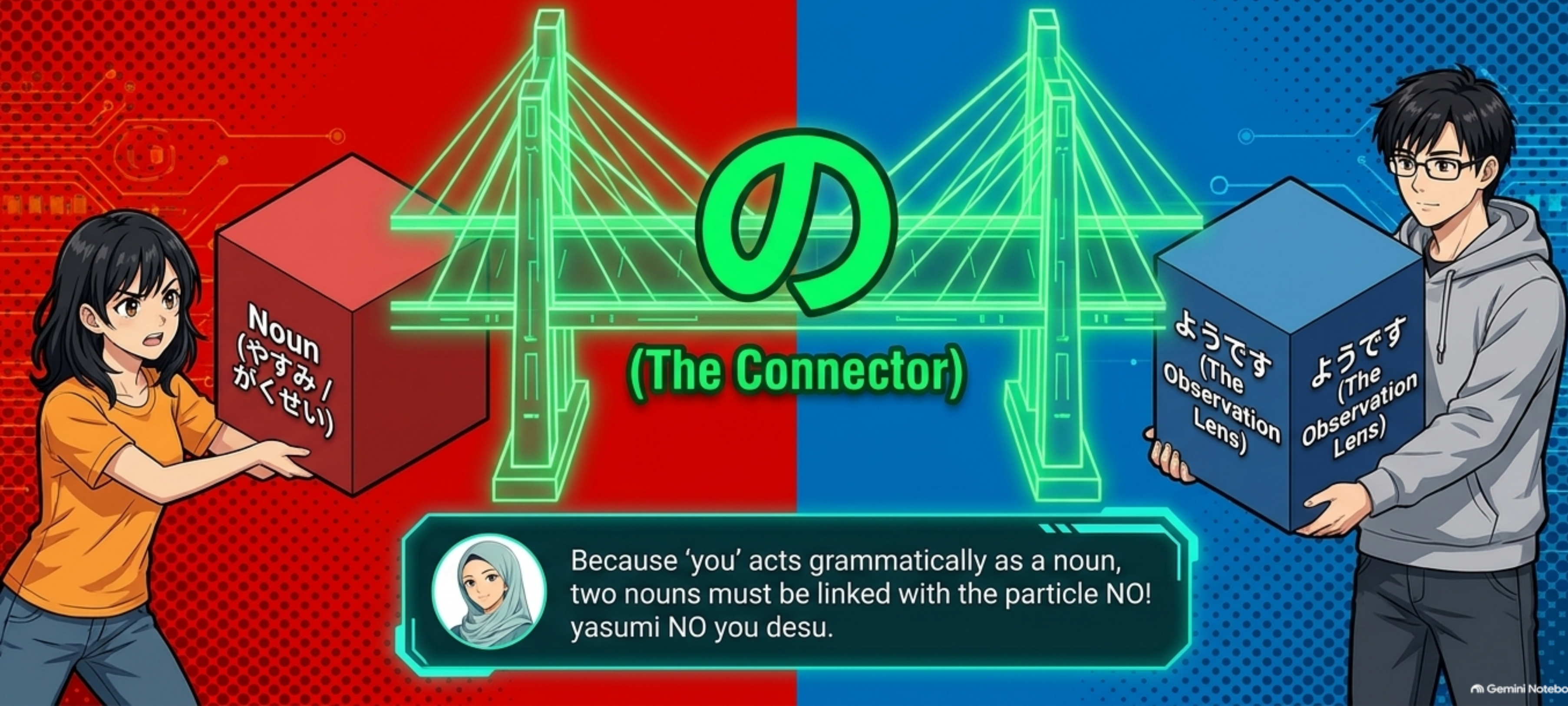
Observation → Deduction

「あしたは
やすみの
ようです。」

(It seems tomorrow is a holiday.)

We make a deduction about
a status or identity based
on physical clues!

The Core Connection: The NO Bridge



Because 'you' acts grammatically as a noun, two nouns must be linked with the particle NO! yasumi NO you desu.

Sentence Assembly Line



あしたは やすみの ようです。
(It seems that tomorrow is a holiday.)

Verbs (Plain Form)

➡ くる + ようです

I-Adj (Plain Form)

➡ たかい + ようです

Na-Adj (+ NA)

➡ しずかな +
ようです

Noun (+ NO)

➡ やすみの +
ようです



The Danger Zone: Don't do this!

「がくせいだ
ようです!」

✗ Using "だ" (da)
before ようです

Joy, wait! Never use 'da' before 'you desu'!

○ Connect with NO: かれは がくせいの
ようです (It seems he is a student).

Grammar Cheat Sheet



Structure: Noun + の + ようです。

Meaning: It seems [Noun] / It appears to be [Noun].

The Golden Rule: Always connect Nouns to ようです using の in the present affirmative! Never use だ!

Time Travel (Forms):

- Present: やすみの ようです
- Negative: やすみじゃない ようです
- Past: やすみだった ようです

Examples:

- やすみの ようです (It seems to be a holiday)
- がくせいの ようです (It seems he is a student)
